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Message from the Executive Director

The mission of Communities Supporting Schools is to provide opportunities for students to stay in school, graduate, and be successful in life. Communities Supporting Schools is dedicated to the mission of serving the youth in this community- one day at a time. In the non-profit sector everything NEEDS to be measured in an effort to determine IMPACT. However, we have learned that some things simply can't be measured, no matter how hard one tries. Because of the work that we do, providing additional "layers of support" to our youth, it may be years before progress can really be measured. The immediate impact may simply be that a student begins to read with enthusiasm and learns to love coming to school. Another immediate result of our work may be that a student who is chronically absent may attend school without missing days. It is the "little things" that often are the "big things" in our work. "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world." This quote, by Nelson Mandela, is one of my favorites. If we can teach our youth to value education, then we can help them change their world.

Since March 2020, when our world was turned upside down, CSS of Wayne has continued to serve our youth. Although the services that we provided last year looked a bit different, our staff NEVER stopped working! During the 2020-2021 school year, we offered services in new formats. We learned about "Google Meets" as a platform at the school level and even trained reading volunteers to continue working with students in reading. We offered virtual "sentencing circles" on the Restorative Justice side of the program and learned that this practice actually offered some components that are more valuable in working with our youth than the traditional teen court option. We learned that there are long-lasting effects of COVID, and that our youth missed valuable "learning time," even though we offered remote learning opportunities. Another major lesson learned was the importance of having educators and "caring adults" who support our students- every day- as they learn and grow.

Our work is definitely cut out for us as we move through this school year. However, the staff at CSS of Wayne is committed to doing not only good work- but great work! We have a community that is supportive and engaged, with a number of dedicated volunteers who are willing to serve.

2020-2021 Staff Changes

As the 2020-2021 academic year began, there were some staff changes in the restorative justice program and in the main office at Communities Supporting Schools. BreAnna VanHook-Battle, teen court/community service director for three years, resigned from CSS of Wayne in August 2020 to take a position with Legal Aid in Raleigh. Barbara Nelson, a juvenile court attorney and formerly a CSS of Wayne teen court volunteer, joined our team to be the restorative justice director. In September 2020, Aleisha Santos, a criminal justice major who had also a teen court volunteer, joined the office as the part-time Restorative Justice Assistant. In January of 2021, Aleisha became a full-time employee, taking over some responsibilities as Gene Jackson retired in December of 2020. Gene had served CSS of Wayne at Southern Wayne High School as a success coach since 2013. Gene had not only worked as a success coach, but had monitored and tracked data, maintained the website, and created the CSS of Wayne newsletters. In the fall of 2021, CSS of Wayne welcomed two new elementary success coaches. Nancy Lancaster joined the CSS team at Brogden Primary School and Wendy Hooks joined at Carver Elementary School. With these changes, CSS of Wayne has continued to grow in new directions.

- 1 Salesforce Consultant Dawn Amory helped to develop a system that would provide data to more accurately measure the impact of the work that we do.
- 2 Kriquette's Kidz: Serving students and families in the community, the Kriquette's Kidz program assisted over 400 children. This program will become a NEW non-profit in Juary 2022 in an effort to serve more families in the community
- Fundraisers: Two successful fundraisers were held last year.

CARVER HEIGHTS ELEMENTARY GARDEN PROJECT

A \$500 grant from United Way to Carver Heights Elementary School sparked a massive community effort to plan, prepare, and plant six gardens at the school. The statement "Many hands make light work" was certainly meant for a day like April 14th, 2021 when over 50 volunteers showed up for our Garden Workday. Tireless volunteers from SJAFB, United Way, Goldsboro High School graduates, and Goldsboro Housing Authority pitched in to help clean out weeds, fill soil and compost in the beds, and plant hundreds of vegetables and flowers.



Restorative Justice Training

Attorney Jon Powell is a law professor at Campbell University in Raleigh, NC, and serves as the director of the Restorative Justice Clinic. Attorney Powell conducted a two-day Restorative Justice training for the CSS Restorative Justice Program, its volunteers, and sister organizations. Read below to learn about this training.

"Wayne County Communities in Schools has embraced Restorative Justice and the practices that go along with it. I had the privilege recently to sit for two days with about fifteen folks from Wayne County who work with young people on the daily. They gave of their time to learn about the Restorative tool called Circle Process. They gave of their time because they care about kids and community. They care about becoming a bridge that connects and not a bridge that divides. I was so encouraged to know that so many people in Wayne County care so deeply about their young people because they know that even though we are supposed to have been created equal, we don't always treat each other that way. Circle process is a way to build relationship, to see each other as brothers and sisters and to work to support all people. It is a way to become a bridge that connects and not a bridge that divides."
